1. **Sandra L. Bloom, M.D.** (USA) Video speaking 50min.
Associate Professor at Drexel University School of Public Health. Dr. Bloom has been in the field of Trauma informed care since 1980s in United States, and has proposed Sanctuary Model in order to understand re-traumatization in the trauma support field and to create a safe and secure organization for prevention.
At the symposium, she would present the basic concept of Trauma informed Care in organizations.
2. **Melissa K. Runyon, Ph.D.** Licensed Psychologist (USA) 50min.
Apprentice and coworker of Dr. Deblinger, who is the founder of TF-CBT. Former Professor of psychiatry at Rowan University- School of Osteopathic Medicine. Owner of PLLC Training and Consultant Services. Melissa and Dr. Deblinger created Combined Parent-Child Cognitive Behavioral Therapy (CPC-CBT), an evidence-based treatment designed to address the needs of children and families at-risk for child physical abuse.
At the symposium, she would present trauma informed care for children and families at risk for abuse. (in order to support children, families need to be intervened in a trauma informed manner)
3. **Tan Li Jen** Clinical Psychologist (Singapore) 50min.
Senior Principal Clinical Psychologist and Senior Deputy Director at Ministry of Social and Family Development (MSF), and the leader of physical abuse intervention team at Trauma Recovery Center in Singapore. She works at the forefront of the field as supervisor, TF-CBT trainer, and conducting consultation on Evidence Based Treatment, and the Crisis Intervention and Resilience Unit as well.
At the symposium, she would present the trauma care situation in Singapore.
